Last month, as a second installment of our Masonic Education program, we hosted Past Grand Master Russ Charvonia for a lecture on Civility. It was not only thought-provoking but compelling. I must say that so much of the concepts of such a

topic touched me deeply. I did a great deal of soul searching in evaluating my own life that I would like to share with you some of the bullet points that Most Worshipful Charvonia touched on.

Civility is a core principle in Freemasonry, deeply embedded in its teachings, rituals, and interactions

among members. The fraternity is dedicated to moral and ethical development. Freemasonry emphasizes respect, courtesy, and brotherhood, fostering an environment where men of diverse backgrounds can unite in harmony. Civility in Freemasonry is not just about politeness; it reflects a deeper commitment to treating others with dignity, engaging in constructive dialogue, and upholding the values of integrity and mutual respect.

Discussions on divisive topics such as politics and religion are prohibited in Masonic lodges to maintain harmony and avoid discord. This rule reinforces the practice of civility by encouraging members to focus on shared values rather than differences. Masons are taught to listen with an open mind, speak with kindness, and act with patience, ensuring that every brother is valued regardless of personal opinions or beliefs.

> Beyond the lodge, Masons are expected to practice civility in their daily lives, serving as examples of good character within their communities. Freemasons contribute to a more respectful and unified society by embodying demonstrating that true strength lies not in

dominance or division, but in understanding and mutual
